

# Retirement Paycheck Checklist

A one-page checklist to help you choose your Social Security claiming age and organize a simple withdrawal plan.

## 1) Social Security Claiming Decision

■	I know my Full Retirement Age (FRA).
■	I've compared what my benefit looks like at ages 62, FRA, and 70.
■	I've considered my health and family longevity.
■	I've identified whether I need income now or can wait.
■	If I'm working before FRA, I understand the earnings test and how it could affect cash flow.

## 2) Withdrawal Plan (Next 12 Months)

■	I have a written withdrawal plan for the next 12 months (not just a guess).
■	I know which account my withdrawals will come from first (taxable, traditional, Roth).
■	I've considered tax impact before pulling from traditional IRA/401(k) accounts.
■	I've set a target monthly paycheck amount from my portfolio (in addition to Social Security).

## 3) Inflation & Market Drop Plan

■	I have a plan for how my income increases over time as costs rise.
■	I understand how my portfolio is rebalanced so withdrawals aren't forced from the wrong place.
■	I know what I would do if markets drop (without panic-selling).

## 4) Couples & Survivor Income (If Married)

■	We've discussed how the higher earner's claiming age affects survivor income.
■	We've modeled the plan assuming one spouse lives longer.
■	We understand the difference between spousal benefits and survivor benefits (high level).

## 5) Healthcare & Medicare Budget

<input type="checkbox"/>	I know whether higher income could trigger IRMAA surcharges.
<input type="checkbox"/>	I have a plan for healthcare costs beyond Medicare basics.
